Greyt health & safety

Keeping your dog safe in the summer

The warm, sunny summer months may seem like the ideal time for you to be out and about with your dog. But hot weather can be uncomfortable for dogs and even dangerous for their health.

Take these steps to keep your dog safe in the summertime:

Exercise safely. If it's hot out for you, it's even hotter for your dogs. On hot or humid days, opt for shorter, less-intense walks, runs, or games of fetch. Try to take them out in early morning or late evening to avoid direct sun.

Dogs with white ears are at higher risk of sunburn and even skin cancer from too much sun exposure. Apply pet-safe sunscreen to your dog's ears, nose, and coat before heading out.

Short-nosed or flat-faced dogs like



boxers and pugs are more likely to have trouble breathing and get overheated in the summer. Avoid taking them outside when it's hot. When you do, take frequent breaks, and always carry water.

Avoid asphalt. Walking on hot asphalt can overheat dogs since they're close to the ground. Asphalt can also burn their paw pads. To check whether asphalt is too hot for them to walk on, lay the back of your hand on it for 10 seconds. If it feels too hot for you, it's too hot for your pet. Walk on the grass instead.

Provide shade and water. When your dogs spend time outside, they need access to shade. Trees or tarps work well, as they allow for free air flow. But avoid outdoor doghouses, which can trap heat. Make sure they have plenty of fresh water whenever they're outside. You can add ice cubes to keep it cool.

Visit the vet. Because they're more likely to come into contact with other animals when they're outside, vaccinations are especially important in the warm months. Summer also brings out bugs of all kinds. So make sure your pet is current on their shots. And ask your vet about the best ways to keep your dog safe from fleas and ticks, as well as mosquitoes that can carry heartworm.

Don't leave your dog in a car. Cars can quickly get hot inside, even when the weather isn't very sunny. Never leave a dog in the car, even if the windows are rolled down or you're parked in the shade. Your pet may get overheated, which could lead to heatstroke. It's illegal

to leave a dog in a parked car in some states. Leaving the air conditioner on with your pet inside is risky, too. Your pet could knock the car out of gear, or the engine could cut off.


Practice water safety. Not all dogs are good swimmers. Don't leave them unsupervised at the pool or lake. If you're on a boat, put a floatation device on your dog in case they fall into deep water. Don't let them drink chlorinated pool water or salt water, which can make them sick. Rinse your dog off at the end of the day to remove chlorine or salt from their fur.

Keep unscreened windows closed.

Open windows let in welcome fresh air. But a fall from a window can be fatal for your dog. Keep unscreened windows and doors shut. If you have screens, make sure they're tightly secured.

Don't shave your dog. You can trim your dog's long fur or give them a haircut, but don't shave them completely. Dogs' coats help insulate them from heat and protect them from sunburns.

Avoid fireworks. If you're heading to celebrations that include fireworks, leave your pets at home. Lit fireworks can burn dogs. And loud noises can frighten and disorient them, making them more likely to run away. If your dog fears fireworks, keep them home and inside. Put them in a safe area, away from windows. Turn on the TV, radio, or a white noise machine to drown out the noise. Be careful the next day, too. The chemicals in unused fireworks can harm dogs, so make sure they can't get to them.

Store garden chemicals safely. Rat poison, insecticides, and other garden chemicals can harm dogs who eat them. Keep such chemicals tightly closed and out of reach of your curious pet. When you walk your dog, avoid grass that's been recently sprayed with chemicals. Call your veterinarian or the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center at (888) 426-4435 if you think your dog has been in contact with something poisonous. The Poison Control Center is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

Keep certain foods and drinks away from your dog. When you host summer parties, keep a close eye on your dog. Alcoholic drinks and some human foods, like chocolate, onions, raisins, and grapes, can harm dogs. They can lead to intoxication, diarrhea, and other stomach issues, or even a coma. Secure your trash can and keep unsafe foods and drinks out of reach.

Warning signs of dehydration and heatstroke in dogs

Dogs are more likely to get dehydrated in the summer months. This means they lose more water through panting, peeing, and

evaporation through their paws than they take in. While a bowl of cool water can help your dog rehydrate, they may need medical attention in some cases.

Stay alert for warning signs of dehydration such as:

- Panting
- · Dry gums and nose
- Thick saliva
- Sluggishness
- Sunken eyes
- Loss of elasticity in the skin

You can give your dog an electrolyteinfused water solution to help them hydrate. If they still seem dehydrated, they may need to get fluids from a vet.

If your dog is exposed to heat for too long, they're risk for a heatstroke. They need immediate cooling down and may also need medical attention.

Symptoms of the early stages of heatstroke include:

- Heavy panting
- Fast breathing
- Lots of drooling
- Bright red gums and tongue
- Trouble with balance

Symptoms of more advanced heatstroke are:

- White or blue gums
- Sluggishness or can't move
- Uncontrollable peeing or pooping
- Labored, noisy breathing
- Shock

If you notice early signs of heatstroke, take your dog inside with air conditioning or to a cool, shaded area. Your dog's temperature should never go above 104 degrees F. Spray water on your dog and fan them until their body temperature comes below 102 degrees F. Give them small amounts of water or ice cubes.

If you can't cool them down or you notice signs of advanced heatstroke, get to a vet right away. Your dog may need fluids, oxygen, and medication.

Dog ice cream recipe

You scream, I scream, we all bark for ice cream! When the weather turns hot, treat your furry friend to a frosty treat. This homemade dog ice cream recipe is easy to make and only uses ingredients that are safe for your pup.

You'll notice one ingredient that's missing in this recipe—milk. Although

puppies drink milk, after weaning dogs no longer produce the enzyme needed to break down the lactose in cow's milk and other dairy-based products. Dairy products can also be high in fat and sugar, which can cause gastrointestinal upset. As an alternative, we suggest using kefir or plain fat-free Greek yogurt (as long as they do not include artificial sweeteners like xylitol, which are toxic to your pets). Blend or mix in some of their favorite snacks, but be sure to avoid dangerous foods such as chocolate, coffee or espresso beans, and macadamia nuts when creating this delicious mouthwatering treat.

Ingredients

- 32 oz plain fat-free Greek yogurt or Kefir
- 2 ripe bananas (you can also sub in or add blueberries, apple without the core or seeds, watermelon, pumpkin, or fresh or natural peanut butter)

Instructions

- Blend together the yogurt or kefir with the add-ins of your choice, using a blender. If mixing by hand, the consistency will be less smooth, but your dog won't mind (we promise).
- 2. Line a 9 x 9" baking dish with parchment paper and spread the yogurt mixture in evenly. At this step, you can top with some complementing fruit.
- 3. Freeze for 3 to 4 hours until the mixture has fully hardened.
- 4. Lift the frozen block out of the pan and peel off the paper.
- 5. Cut into suitable sized squares using a sharp knife.
- Store in freezer for the summer, with a maximum time shelf life of two months.
- 7. Serve as cubes to your dog or let them thaw a bit in their bowl for a soft served ice cream treat.







Editor's Note: When we lose one of our greyhounds, GAGC makes a donation in that dog's memory to 4 Legs 4 Hounds which is a nonprofit program located at Ohio State University that helps greyhounds recover from racing injuries or health issues after they retire.

We received the sad news that Andrea R. and Nate S. lost their boy **Torpedo** on July 6. They went for a hike in a shaded area and **Torpedo** began to struggle. He was improving after they got home but later started to decline. From Andrea and Nate: "By the time we reached the vet, he had passed. We're heartbroken and deeply miss our boy." We're so sorry to hear of this sudden loss.

Mel and *Jon R*. had to say goodbye to their 13-year-old cat **Monster** in early July. We send them our condolences.

We were so sorry to hear that *John* and *Sue K*. had to let their **Sally** go on July 17. At age 12, she had been struggling for a while. An ultrasound showed issues with her spleen, likely irritable bowel syndrome, thickness in intestinal wall limiting protein uptake, and more. Despite vet visits and consultations with experts, medications, and special food, they were not able to turn things around. We send them our sympathy.

We received word from *Erin* and *Josh G.* that their girl **Deco Bar Fire** (**Piper**)
passed July 20. She had been seen for
a pinched nerve in her neck and was
on medication but then she took a turn
for the worse. Soon she could not hold
any food or water down and passed
peacefully at only 6 years old. From *Josh*:
I'm thankful to have spent four wonderful,
happy years with her and she will always
be a part of my heart.

Mike and Mariella C. said goodbye to 12-year-old **Orion** on Aug. 3. **Orion** started having health issues about eight months ago and his time finally ran out. From Mike: "We had to say goodbye to my best friend. He is no longer in pain and is now with his pack: **Houdini, Veda, Layla, Thyssen,** and **Trey.** They're running and chasing together." We send them our deepest sympathy.

We were notified that *Emily* and *Justin F*. had to have their **Spartacus** euthanized on Aug. 6. He had developed an aggressive splenic sarcoma and despite surgery and chemo, they were not able to save him. From *Emily*: We are so lucky to have adopted **Spartacus**. He has been

a joy to have in our lives and is simply a wonderful buddy and friend.

We received word in mid-August that *Frank* and *Beth H*. lost their boy **Shimme** about six months ago. We are sorry to hear of this loss and send them our condolences.

On Aug. 16 we heard the sad news from *Mike M*. that he had to put his boy **Kelso** down a few weeks earlier as he was no longer able to stand and walk. We send *Mike* our sympathy.

Heather C. informed us that her girl Willow died Aug. 18 at the emergency vet. Willow had been having some autoimmune issues that were under control until a flare up left her unable to breathe. Unfortunately, she couldn't be saved. We send Heather our heartfelt sympathy.

Willow was pure joy in a greyhound's body. Every morning she woke up with excited barks and a happy dance to greet the day. She loved every person, dog, and cat she ever met and was excited to make new friends. **Willow** believed that all beds were dog beds and enjoyed all the comforts and treats of retired life. *Brenda* brought **Willow** into our lives shortly after I adopted **Switzi**, and she and **Switzi** were best friends from the start. She and my cat, **Watson**, also had a strong bond and often shared a bed when they napped. 
