

How to protect your pet before an emergency strikes

Excerpt from Home Again September 2019

Whenever there is a hurricane, tornado, forest fire, earthquake or other natural disaster, the last thing you want to do is search for a pet-friendly place to take shelter or gather your pet's necessary items. Over 280 natural disasters were reported around the world in 2018¹—don't wait for one to strike! Protect your pet by preparing ahead of time with these tips.

Have a plan

One of the most important things you can do to prepare for a natural disaster is to have a plan. Create a checklist of the items you may need and keep your pet's emergency information in an easy to find location, like a wallet or purse. In the

event your pet ever goes missing, you'll have all their information in one place. If you need inspiration for what to include in your checklist and wallet card, check out this Pet Disaster and Safety Checklist from the American Red Cross.

Additionally, make sure to gather any of your pet's medical papers and a list of their vaccinations. If your pet is injured, it's helpful to have these papers, especially if you're unable to see your primary veterinarian. Before a disaster strikes, it may also be useful to practice putting your pet in their carrier and running through a full evacuation with your family—including your furry friend! That way, if an evacuation is needed, your family is already familiar with your plan.

Find a place to take shelter

Before any disaster heads your way, identify local evacuation shelters for yourself and your pet. VCA Animal Hospitals offer pet healthcare services across the country – including free pet boarding during natural disasters.

Create a Pet Emergency Kit

Keeping a kit stocked and ready will allow you to evacuate quickly without forgetting any of your pet's important things.

Some items to include:

- Prescriptions
- Toys or comfort items
- Any veterinarian prescribed medications to help keep them relaxed in stressful situations
- Collar with updated tags
- Leashes
- List of hotels that are pet-friendly
- Food, water and treats
- Water and food bowls



- Doggy bags
- List of their prescriptions/medications
- A copy of their medical history and vaccinations

Know where to go in case of an injury

Despite preparation, accidents can still occur, and pets can get injured during the chaos. Before a natural disaster, research the closest local veterinary clinic to your home. If your pet takes any medication, don't wait until you are almost out of their prescription. Try keeping at least two weeks' worth on hand in case veterinary offices or pharmacies are closed.

Have your pets microchipped

Microchipping is vital to a pet's safety during a natural disaster as they can get hurt, collars can get lost or their appearance can be altered in various ways. A study of more than 7,700 stray animals at various animal shelters showed that dogs without microchips were returned to their owners 21.9% of the time, whereas microchipped dogs were returned to their owners 52.2% of the time. Cats without microchips were reunited with their owners only 1.8%



of the time, whereas microchipped cats went back home 38.5% of the time².

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Seven ways to help your pet de-stress

Excerpt from Home Again October 2019 Newsletter

Loud noises, large groups of unknown people, other animals, young children ... the list of things that can panic your pets goes on and on. But don't fret, there are several ways you can calm your pets when they begin to get overwhelmed. Like humans, dogs and cats have a fight or flight response when they feel overwhelmed or intimidated, as seen when a dog hides or a cat hisses.¹

Stay calm.

Your pet can read your energy and will act according to your feelings. Therefore, it's imperative that you stay calm when your pet begins to get anxious. Pets might act out when they get stressed, but scolding them will only make matters worse.

Watch your tone and pitch when talking.

Just as pets respond excitedly to your highpitched voice, they will also calm down if your voice does. Speaking calmly and positively to your pets will help them relax a little. ¹

Put your pet on a leash.

If your dog begins to get overwhelmed at a dog park or in a public area, keeping them on a leash can ease some of their anxiety. It will also allow you to stay calm and ease some of your stress. You can get your pet's attention more easily by keeping the leash

short and letting him or her know you are there.

Keep your pet close.

If you are home or in an enclosed place, letting your pet cuddle up to you can help them relax. Let them sit near you or stand between your legs so you can both breathe easier. It is important to make sure that while you're cuddling and comforting them, you don't overdo it. If you do, you could end up confirming your pet's fears.¹

Send your pets "home."

If your pet is at the vet and getting anxious, like so many do, putting them in their crate, or "home" can relax them. Being in a familiar environment surrounded by their scent can put them more at ease. Also, creating a border between your pet and the others in a veterinary office will provide them with additional security, remove them from the stressful situation and allow them to relax.¹

Distract them.

If your pet begins to panic, it may be best for you to distract them. Whether that be by giving them treats or playing with them, sometimes the best thing you can do is



pull their attention away from whatever is stressing them out.¹

Have a plan.

If your pet tends to bolt when they're stressed, make sure you're thinking one step ahead of them. Always keep doors, windows and gates secured, and ask house guests to be mindful when they enter and exit your home. The most important thing you can do as a pet parent in this situation is to be attentive to your pet's needs. If they want to hide under the couch, let them. If they cower in their crate, that's fine too. As long as they're not lashing out, let your pet react the way they want—just make sure they're safe and that you're there for them.

Items for sale



Dog Runs

Hurricane Dorian kept changing our plans for an early September Florida dog run. *Kathy* and *Irene* planned to drive to West Virginia on Sept. 4, then the 5th, then the 6th, to meet the Florida dog hauler. In the end, the hauler changed his plans to take our dogs to WV and instead delivered four females to *Brenda*'s house! Our new girls are **SE's Diggin In**, **PJ So Jaded**, **Bjay's Rummy**, and **PJ Fence Jumper**.

After pottying, photos and meals for the new pups; *Brenda*, *Irene*, and *Kathy* drove them to Moore Vet Hospital where they will be vetted in the next few days.

Way too early on Sept. 12, with *Kathy* and *Chris* in one car and *Irene* and *Tara* in another, we headed to West Virginia to meet the hauler from Florida. Our rendezvous time in WV was 8 a.m. but it was worth the early start. *Phil* brought us five wonderful boys this time, ranging in size from 59 pounds to 86 pounds! The boys are **WW Donatello, WW Jicco, B's Big Papa, BBG Cash the King,** and **CTW Game Changer**. *Irene* and *Tara* transported little **WW Jicco** and **CTW Game Changer** while the other three big boys rode with

WW Donatello and **B's Big Papa** on the last leg of their trip from Florida on Sept. 12.



Kathy and Chris. Irene reported her boys were quiet for most of the ride. In Kathy's car, **Donatello** was up and about visiting and exploring while the other two tried to sleep. Brenda met them at Dr. Moore's; all the boys were weighed and photographed and settled into the kennel to await their vetting.

We got a terrific surprise when the Florida hauler agreed to deliver six new dogs directly to Brenda's house in October; three girls: T Buffy Episode, Superior Rina, and BGR Lois Lane; and three boys: LK's Eforce, Imark Diesel, and Thanx for **Plavin**. Here's *Brenda*'s account: The six new dogs arrived at my house Monday, Oct. 7 at 5 a.m. from Florida. Robin, Irene, Ron, Kyle, and I welcomed them to Ohio, getting them off the hauler and letting them do their business after the long ride. Irene made quiche for the humans to enjoy while the pups were eating. They rested until 8 a.m. when we took them to Dr. Moore's office where Kathy met us to help with pottying and weighing. The dogs are always well taken care of there and will be ready for their foster homes soon after their surgeries. As you see, this is a team effort and I thank you all.

Brenda and Irene each drove to West Virginia on Oct. 23 to meet the Florida dog hauler. This time he brought us five dogs: females TNT Mama Mia and WW Law N Order, who rode with Irene; and males RS Money Hungry, WW Maraschino, and KB's Chipper, who made the drive to Ohio with Brenda. Once they were back in town, Kathy met them at the vet to help with turn outs, weighing, and photos. Here's some input from Brenda: "What a gorgeous fall day for Irene and me to take a 3½ hour ride to West Virginia picking up

five retired racers from Florida. The leaves were full of color and the drive was easy. We waited a little longer for the hauler to arrive and the pups getting off were glad to finally relieve themselves. After the potty break, we put the boys in my car and Irene took the girls and we headed straight to *Dr. Moore's* office where *Kathy* and *Maria* welcomed the newbies. The dogs got to eat and settle down for the night. It is so exciting to be a part of finding these dogs their forever homes!"

We had only one day notice of the dog run to West Virginia on Oct. 30, and it turned out to be an early rendezvous. *Kathy* left home at 5:30 a.m. and made the drive to pick up two handsome males: red fawn **Superior Uno** and black-and-white **Don't Tell on Me**. Super nice boys! She drove back to Ohio and straight to her house with them; *Brenda* met her there to help with pottying and photos. 


Vicki

We tried to take her to families to find her forever home, but each time she kept looking at me as if to ask, "when are we going home?" We adopted her at my one-year anniversary of being cancer free. We love you, **Vicki**, and will miss you dearly. We hope that you find **Dexter**, **Bella**, **Luna**, **Izzy**, and **Jeanie** over the Rainbow Bridge.

Basia (WV's Bays)

July 28, 2007 to October 24, 2019

There's something about those little red girls: feisty, hard-headed, independent. **Basia** actually picked me, many years ago. I fostered her a few days before the regular foster was available, then moved her to their house. She lasted a week with them; they said she was terrified of the cat, wouldn't come inside after turn outs, etc. I went to pick her up and she came racing up to me like I was her best friend in the world. I knew then I was doomed. I adopted her a few weeks later when she was about 22 months old.

My girl never raced. She flunked racing school probably because she was shy; they likely never got her to go in a starting gate. **Basia** was glad to pass on M&Gs and other events and just stay home, but she could be a spitfire with me and my other greyhounds, bumping up against us with her muscular little body. I nicknamed her The Red Tank.

In January 2019, she had a significant stroke, the first of several vestibular events that took their toll on her. While she recovered almost completely from the stroke, she became a very picky eater. That led to months of hand feeding, experimenting with new foods, whatever it took to get some calories into her. She gradually lost weight and muscle mass and started declining dramatically. On Oct. 21, I told her that if she was ready to give up the fight, I was OK with that. Three days later, she had another massive stroke and died before she could be euthanized. True to her character, she died on her own terms at 12 years old, on a lovely fall day filled with sunshine.

Our program encouraging GAGC members to sponsor one of our foster dogs for \$20 has been very successful. The sponsorship fees go toward the cost of




