Greyt health & safety

Homemade pumpkin dog treat recipe

Autumn means crisp air, golden leaves, and all things pumpkin. Pumpkin isn't just for humans—it's also great for dogs! Pumpkin is a great source of fiber, which can help with maintaining intestinal health and normal stools. It also contains vitamins A, C, and E, as well as important minerals including potassium, iron, zinc, and beta-carotene.

Bring fall straight to your kitchen and get your pup's tail wagging with this easy three-ingredient recipe.

Ingredients

- 2 cups whole wheat flour (regular white flour will work as well)
- 1 cup canned pureed pumpkin (not pumpkin pie filling—it includes additional sugars, fats, and spices that are dangerous to your dog)



doesn't contain artificial sweeteners like xylitol)

Directions

- Preheat your oven to 375°F
- Add the pumpkin and peanut butter to a large mixing bowl and stir to combine.
- Stir in the flour until the mixture creates a dough.
- Roll out the dough about ½ inch thick on a lightly floured surface.
- Cut out fall shapes using a small cookie cutter or knife. Bonus points if you use a fall-themed cookie cutter in a pumpkin shape.
- Place the treats about half an inch apart on an ungreased cookie sheet.
- Bake for 12 minutes.
- Let cool completely before giving to your dog to enjoy.

The right way to pet a dog, according to veterinarians

Yes, that German shepherd is adorable, but there's a specific protocol you should follow when approaching dogs you haven't met before.


After reading that above headline, you may have thought to yourself, "There's no right or wrong way to pet a dog. I've had

dogs my whole life!" It's true that canines tend to be less persnickety than cats when it comes to human affection, but veterinarians stress that there's still some etiquette you should follow when petting a dog. This is especially true if it's a dog you don't know.

Much like humans, dogs are complex creatures with a wide range of personalities, so it helps to know the basics of dog psychology and body language before approaching that adorable golden retriever in the park. The best way to initiate contact with a dog (after getting the owner's permission, of course) is to reach out and let the dog sniff your hand.

"Dogs live through their olfactory sense much more than their visual one," Dr. Uri Burstyn, a veterinarian from Vancouver who also educates pet owners on YouTube, tells Mental Floss. Be sure to keep your hands curled, as if you were chopping vegetables, just in case the dog feels threatened and lunges to bite your fingers.

If the dog seems pretty comfortable and doesn't recoil from your hand, the best place to pet a dog is under the chin. The one thing you should never do is immediately start patting the dog's head. This can be seen as a dominant, aggressive gesture because dogs generally keep their nose to the ground. If a dog feels something touching the top of his head, he might think it's a bigger dog attacking him and react in a defensive manner. "There's an old joke that dogs can't look up," Dr. Burstyn says. "They can, but hardly ever do."

Ohio-based veterinary behaviorist
Meghan Herron also cautions against
touching a strange dog's belly because it's
such a vulnerable area. In some cases, a
dog might reveal his tummy to show that
he's feeling intimidated, and to convey
that he's not a threat. People tend to
think this means the dog wants his belly
scratched, but that isn't always the case.

Of course, many dogs are comfortable with these types of interactions—even with strangers—because they're used to being around people. However, Herron suggests erring on the side of caution. "What I recommend is just to assume they're not [socialized] and pet them in a way that's as least threatening as possible," Herron tells Mental Floss. "Let it be the dog's choice."

Aside from these precautions, Burstyn and Herron recommend avoiding sensitive areas, like a dog's paws or rump. Once you're on good terms with a dog, try petting areas that are generally considered "good spots," like the lower back and chest. This will vary depending on the dog, so pay attention to the

subtle body cues they're sending you. A wagging tail just means a dog is ready to interact, which could mean that the dog is ready to bite. Instead, look for a dog with a wildly waving "helicopter tail" whose body is wiggly and loose, rather than stiff and rigid, Herron says. These are signs that a dog is happy and comfortable.




Have we said recently how much we appreciate Alan Schrager of Nature's Select? He is so good to us, providing food for our foster dogs at a discount. Thanks, Alan!


Dog runs, fosters & adoptions





Braska Lydia (Liddy)

June 16, 2013-Oct. 2, 2022



Liddy was a re-home, having only been in her first "forever" home for a week or so before the owner returned her. She showed up with her front paw bandaged and we knew immediately she might be a handful, but we also knew that sometimes dogs just need to be shown love and stability before their true personalities shine. We often referred to her as our "cat," since she rarely sought out attention (though she certainly didn't turn it away if we were offering!). Eventually she settled in, and although she preferred to keep her distance from visitors to our house, she became very attached to her pack—myself, my husband, and our two boys. Over the years, her luck was often lousy. Arriving bandaged with stitches seemed to foreshadow what was to come—stitches for her ear, her side, her shoulder, and another paw. But despite the freak accidents that always seemed to find her, she was a loyal companion. She loved roaching when she slept, sleeping sprawled across the air vents, bites of steak, peanut butter, and rotisserie chicken, and she was always up for rooing. In April 2021, Liddy had a massive stroke.

It was an emotional time, as we struggled with what was best for her. Ultimately, we decided to give her a chance at a full recovery which involved re-learning to stand, get up, walk, and eat regular dog food. After a long, difficult road, we got her back to about 75-80% of her old self. Despite partial blindness and right-sided weakness, we knew our **Liddy**'s personality was untouched. If anything, she became more loving to us as I believe she learned how much she really needed us, and her trust and love for us deepened. In August 2022, **Liddy** came up lame on her right, back leg, already her weak side from the stroke. A vet visit revealed no obvious cause for the pain. Pain medication had her feeling better, but the pains kept returning and eventually it became obvious that she was struggling. Surrounded by her family who loved her the most, we made the excruciating decision to let her go. Our hearts are broken. Seven years with her was not enough, but I am comforted knowing that she was placed with the family she needed, and we were blessed with the dog we needed.
