From the Blood Bank: Metzger Animal Hospital and the uses of fresh frozen plasma

The Greyhound Health Initiative Blood Bank supplies veterinary clinics and hospitals with blood products to help them respond to emergency cases. The proceeds from the sale of these products help to pay the administrative costs associated with running the blood bank.

Metzger Animal Hospital, located in Pennsylvania, is one of the veterinary hospitals that orders blood products from GHI Blood Bank. Metzger Animal Hospital is committed to veterinary care that helps people by helping pets, embracing technology to advance veterinary medicine, and giving back to their community. Metzger Animal Hospital is committed to following specific guidelines provided by *Dr. Guillermo Couto* who is an expert in greyhound and sighthound medicine by educating clients on their special needs and clinical differences from other breeds.

While most people think of packed red blood cells when they think of the blood bank, Fresh Frozen Plasma is another product that the blood bank produces that helps save lives. Plasma is the liquid component of blood, in which the red blood cells, white blood cells, and platelets are suspended. It makes up a large portion of the blood's volume and consists mostly of water that contains electrolytes and proteins, with the major protein being albumin.

After blood has been collected from our donors it is spun in a refrigerated centrifuge and the red blood cells are separated from the plasma. The red blood cells are sold as packed red blood cells and the plasma is then frozen. Plasma that is frozen is considered Fresh Frozen Plasma good for up to a year if it remains frozen. Often the blood bank has a larger quantity of plasma available since it has a longer shelf life. When we have a large quantity, we often will run a buy-one-get-one sale on Fresh Frozen Plasma. This can help clients and rescues that have financial concerns by having the plasma on site at the hospitals that stock it.

Dr. Kosho is one of the doctors working at

Metzger Animal Hospital and frequently performs lifesaving plasma transfusions. "I started out as a veterinary assistant at Metzger Animal Hospital in 1995 with the dream of becoming a veterinarian in the future. After graduating vet school, I returned to Metzger's as an associate veterinarian. I enjoy soft tissue surgeries, endocrinology and oncology."

Dr. Kosho performs plasma transfusions three to five times per month with the lifesaving result approximately 70% successful. Some of the cases that he has been using this live-saving plasma for are clotting deficiencies, hypoalbuminemia, and pancreatitis.

"After defrosted, we treat it as any blood product transfusion. The patients' vital signs; temperature, pulse, respiration, mucous membrane color, capillary refill time and blood pressure, are monitored throughout the transfusion. It usually takes up to four hours per transfusion."

Monitoring the patients' vital signs closely can identify changes that may indicate reactions that the patient may be having to the transfusion. "Most transfusion patients do very well post transfusion. The recovery is mostly dependent on disease that necessitates the plasma."

Some common clotting factor disorders are Hemophilia A, which is an inherited blood clotting disorder found in dogs. It is the result of a spontaneous mutation of the specific gene that causes a deficiency of blood clotting Factor VIII. Factor VIII is important for normal blood clot formation and is found in plasma. Von Willebrand disease, also called vWD, is another common inherited blood clotting disorder in dogs. It's the result of an insufficient amount of von Willebrand factor (vWF), which is a plasma protein that helps blood to clot. vWD can result in excessive, serious bleeding from even a minor skin wound.

Hypoalbuminemia in dogs can be seen in dogs with liver failure, kidney damage and may indicate chronic malnutrition or protein losing enteropathy. A protein formed in the liver and carried into the blood, albumin binds to many hormones drugs and molecules and is responsible for regulating blood volume by controlling oncotic pressure (pressure in the blood compartment).

Pancreatitis is a condition where the pancreas becomes inflamed. That's an organ near the stomach that helps digest food and control blood sugar. Pancreatitis patients may have a low albumin level (hypoalbuminemia) and a loss of electrolytes by vomiting and diarrhea.

As transfusion medicine continues to

advance, it is important to be aware of the latest information to keep up with this ever-changing field and how blood products are used in day to day clinical practice. It is rewarding to see animals donate blood to help save lives. Veterinary blood donor programs help keep blood products available and continue to save lives every day.




Pet food recalls

GAGC NewsNala and Simba: The rest of the story ...

Many of you followed the story of Nala and **Simba** over the last year. This bonded pair was returned in January 2018 due to a significant change in their family situation. After a lengthy campaign to find a home where they could continue to stay together, they were adopted in February 2018. Unfortunately, in late November, they were returned again because **Simba** was apparently having peeing issues. Interestingly, those issues completely disappeared while he was in foster care. However, other underlying health issues arose with him, so Dr. Moore did extensive testing and diagnostics and we began treating him for several ailments. In the meantime, we had a family lined up to adopt both **Nala** and **Simba**. As days passed, Simba struggled and was unable to keep down any food or water and sadly, he was diagnosed with megaesophagus. The condition progressed very quickly, his health deteriorated, and on Dec. 18, we made the horrible decision to end his suffering and let him go. At the end, he was surrounded by people who cared about him, including his foster mom Kathy, Brenda, and Dr. Moore. Knowing Nala needed a companion, we placed her and Wilma (JS Dog **Gone Wild**) with *Patti* and *Craig* shortly before Christmas. The two girls have settled in nicely in their new home. Those of us closest to **Simba** will never forget that sweet boy.

Changes coming

We are changing our newsletter schedule from every two months to every three months, but we will still be sharing breaking news and event reminders through regular emails from *Brenda*.

GAGC board of directors has decided to increase the adoption fee for new applicants from \$250 to \$275. This will help defer both our increased medical costs and our additional travel expenses for Florida and West Virginia dog runs. Dog Runs

Oct. 25

From Irene: We're on the road again, but this time my partner is my daughter, *Tara*. Her first time ever on a dog run. We excitedly prepared our own pups for a few hours without us and off we went to Senecaville to meet the hauler. The day was rainy and cold, but the sun seemed to appear as *Phil* and all the pups arrived and two handsome laid-back boys from Florida came out of the hauler. Strike **It Famous** and **Cobi's Windstorm** slept all the way to Dr. Moore's office where we were welcomed by the vet staff and Brenda. Photos taken, weights recorded and off the boys went to awaiting dinners and dreams of forever homes.

Nov. 7

Brenda and Irene made the trip back to Senecaville to pick two females: **Bobbie Girl** and **GS Danika**. Here's Irene's account: "Two Florida girls are waiting for forever homes. Brenda and I jumped

Bobbie Girl loved hers and Danika's. Danika wanted nothing but to get moving along to her new adventure with a loving family. Soon we arrived at Brenda and Ron's for a sleepover. Be well, sweetie-pies and enjoy your new lives."

Nov. 26

made the drive to West Virginia to get six dogs from the adoption kennel there. The kennel manager was already holding two boys and a girl for us but we picked three more when we got there. We got four boys: CET Dirty Doug, Whiskey Gentry, Saturn's Titan and Killer Orion; and two girls: CET Yo Mama and Superior Sonata. From Irene: "Rain, gusty winds, snow and road construction will not deter the white GAGC transporter from getting greys to their forever homes. We arrived at the track about 10 a.m. Most of the males were in the turnout, but then we went inside to see the rest of the males and the females. Wow! There were many more to meet. Quickly the decision was made on the girls, but the boys were a problem. All the available males were turned out for us one by one so we could meet them and observe their personalities. Finally, four were chosen and we were on our way to Dr. Moore's. **Titan** needed sweet nothings whispered in his ear, so much of my ride

home was backward so we could bond. Please don't tell **Titan**, but I love **Gentry**, **Doug** and **Orion**, too." In the other vehicle, *Kathy* and *Chris* drove the girls back to Ohio and they barely made a peep the whole time, although **Mama** insisted on getting petted and kept *Chris* busy for much of the ride.

Dec. 3

For the Florida dog run, Irene M. and Doug T. each made the drive to Senecaville to meet the hauler to get three boys: KB's Agent P (Perry), WW Real Racin (Rotate), and KB's Zippo (Zippo); and two girls: MM's Dacia and KB's Floogal. From *Irene*: "It is such a pleasure to accompany these pups to the next leg of their journey to forever homes. This time I got to meet not only five beauties, but I met a fellow member of GAGC, *Doug T. Doug* fell into the routine quickly and with all the dogs loaded safely in our vehicles we were off to *Dr. Moore's* office. **Darcia** and **Floogal** rode with me; they were pros at traveling. The minute they hopped into my car, they were resting comfortably. If you ever have an opportunity to volunteer for a dog

Dec. 11



Their travel from Florida was delayed because of a snow and ice storm in the south. *Phil* drove cautiously and arrived

safely at the rendezvous point. The girls jumped out of the transporter, collars and leashes exchanged, pottied, then back into a vehicle. The little blue greyhound limo was in gear and in a few hours we were at *Dr. Moore's* office. Phil had five dogs for us — two females: Sandia Episode (Sandy) and BL Cher (Emma) and three males: AMF Bestbespeedy (Sergio), Letter to Me (Mighty) and Bombay Saphire (Bombay). Here's Brenda's account first: "Last day of 2018 was spent on the road heading to an hour east of Columbus to meet the dog hauler from Florida. He was running a little late because of the heavy rain. *Irene* and I both drove and *Kyle* rode with *Irene* going and me coming back to my house. It was probably the most stressful drive ever especially carrying such precious cargo. The boys were in my car and Irene brought back the girls. 





Bowie




