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# **Greyt health & safety**

## Struggling with end-of-life pet care and grief is normal, and there are ways to cope with loss

When a pet dies, it's not unusual to feel isolated or alone or find that others don't understand why you're so distraught. But it's perfectly normal to grieve when you lose a pet. Since 2009, the <u>Honoring</u> the Bond program has held an annual remembrance ceremony or provided an online remembrance for bereaved clients of The Ohio State University Veterinary Medical Center. The program honors the strong bond that exists between pets and their owners and recognizes

the need for support and guidance for clients facing the end of a pet's life. It's one of only about six dozen programs in North America that provide veterinary social work services to help clients work through the hard decisions and emotions that arise when a pet is sick or dying.

Read on for answers to common questions about grieving for pets and ways to cope with loss.

#### Why do we grieve when pets die?

Pets give us something most people can't: complete, unconditional, nonjudgmental love. When they're gone, it leaves a hole and brings grief, much like the grief we feel when a human loved one dies. Pets are such a huge part of our lives, sometimes in places we don't share with most family members, including our beds, and the bond formed between owner and pet is incredibly strong.

How is the grief we experience with the loss of animals the same as the grief we experience with the loss of people?

Just like with humans, the extent of the grief we feel is dependent on the type of relationship we had with the pet. We may not feel as strongly or grieve as deeply for one person compared with another, and the same holds true for pets. If a person has multiple pets, the grief experienced over the loss of one may be different from the grief experienced over the loss of another.

The emotions that people feel, the sadness, and maybe anger, are often very similar to the emotions felt when grieving the loss of a person.

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#### How is it different?

Circumstances can be different with pets, specifically when the pet dies through euthanasia. Often with pet loss, the reason we must make the euthanasia decision is because of finances — maybe we can't afford the surgery. And so that's not typically something that we encounter in human medicine.

But making a decision to euthanize a pet for any reason can sometimes cause guilt. In fact, I'd say guilt is the biggest emotion I see with pet loss, even if people know they've made the right decision. It's

still just an enormous burden for some people, and they have questions: Why should it be in my hands to make that decision?

# What should I consider when faced with a euthanasia decision?

#### 1. Quality of life

Consider using a <u>quality-of-life scale</u> to help focus on the pet's quality of life and also your own. There are times when humans are providing so much care for an animal that their own quality of life is suffering, they aren't able to leave the house, or they're not able to take vacations or have friends over. It's OK to look at those things.

2. Consider the timing of the euthanasia and how you will decide when it's time A pet's death is inevitable. We know it's coming, and we don't have any control over that. But we do have some control over what death will look like. Overwhelmingly, more people feel like they wait too long. Tap into resources that help you plan for the death that feels best for you and your pet.

3. Explore additional resources Find resources on the <u>Pet Loss Suggested</u> <u>Reading List</u>.

#### Tips for coping after a pet dies

1. Don't stuff away or ignore feelings of sadness or guilt

Allow yourself to feel. People sometimes say, "You just need to keep busy, so you don't feel bad." The reality is that you need to feel those sad feelings, you need to feel upset, you need to feel angry. Those emotions need to come out, because that's how we get through our grief. Shoving it away or putting it up on a shelf

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isn't usually effective. It's important to look at it straight on at some point.

2. Focus on the positives, the good times, your love for your pet and the things you were able to do

When you look at the whole scheme of things, the euthanasia or the period of death accounts for such a short time. Consider the balance. The death is really intense and really hard over a short period of time, but if you go back and think about your pet's whole life, the good times definitely outweigh the bad times. It's just that the intensity might be much harder right now. The hope is that you do progress in your grief, so you're not feeling as intensely over time.

#### 3. Memorialize your pet

You may want to do something privately with your family, post something on social media, plant a tree or make a donation in your pet's name to a pet shelter or veterinary clinic. Write down funny stories. Make a photo collage or photo album. Journal about happy memories of your pet. Pet loss journals and other grief materials are available. Find additional suggestions at <u>Animal</u> <u>Remembrance Ideas</u>.

4. Find others you can talk to who really understand

It's important to know not only who to talk to but also who you may want to avoid during those times. There

might be people who don't really understand your grief.

5. Consider extended therapy or counseling

If you continue to have intense feeling and you feel stuck,

like you're not progressing or moving forward, reach out to a professional for extended therapy or counseling.

6. Additional resources to help you cope Find additional guidance in the <u>Coping</u> with the Loss of a Pet brochure.

#### Do other pets in the home grieve?

It's hard to know, because they can't really tell us. But it's said that animals in general go through a grieving process. Just as for people, it's dependent on the relationship. We recommend that owners monitor how a surviving animal is doing. Is behavior changing? Is the pet eating less? If you see things that are concerning, call the veterinarian or try to connect with a veterinary behaviorist. Your pet may be going through a grief process and could potentially benefit from medications or other treatment.

#### Should I get a new pet after a pet dies?

When deciding whether to get a new pet, consider the feelings of each family member and try to make sure everyone is on the same page. The typical recommendation is to avoid making any rash decisions or rushing out to get another pet. Some owners may live alone, with pets as their only companions, and they feel a more urgent need to get another pet to help with loneliness. However, it's important to understand that you cannot replace the pet you lost.

And take care in making decisions for others: If a friend loses a pet, don't run out and get a new one as a gift. That may not be what your friend wants.

# The best therapy? Why, your pets, of course The mental health benefits that come with our beloved animals

When I think of my early childhood, I picture a lonely and insecure girl. I lived for books, watching the Monkees singing troupe on TV, and my weekly horseback riding lessons. At the age of 12, I began taking care of an acquaintance's backyard mare, Sheba, and my life improved immeasurably.

Nursing home staff members were loving the visit from *Brenda*'s and *Irene*'s dogs.



Whether cleaning stalls, riding or just watching Sheba quietly munch hay, I felt transported. No longer was I focused on my perceived shortcomings; I had found purpose and joy in caring for Sheba. Our bond was empowering and transformative, and it would set the stage for a lifetime of loving—and living with animals.

It's no secret that companion animals are good for our mental health. Dogs can help with myriad challenges, from providing much needed companionship to acting as a catalyst for their owners to get more exercise—and meet other friendly dog owners—to helping persons struggling with depression and anxiety disorders. This is good news for the nearly 70 percent of Americans ages 50 to 59 who have pets, as well as for the 60 percent of those 60 to 69, and the 50 percent of those 70 and older.

"Research has shown that owning a pet provides an amazing array of health benefits," says Jeremy Barron, M.D., medical director of the Beacham Center for Geriatric Medicine at Johns Hopkins. "Simply petting a dog lowers the stress hormone cortisol, while the social interaction between people and their dogs actually increases levels of the feel-good hormone oxytocin" (the same hormone that bonds mothers to babies). Interacting with pets can lower our blood pressure and lead to better heart health, and those with pets report lower rates of loneliness.

Service animals—those specifically trained to help humans function independently—can perform many activities for sight- or mobility-impaired


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owners. These include opening doors, retrieving medication or water, warning of obstacles in their owner's path, and alerting other people that their owner is in distress. Some animals are even trained to detect cancer or warn of an impending anxiety attack, cardiac event or seizure.

Therapy animals—usually dogs—also receive special training but their main function is to be a source of comfort and to spread happiness. You might see them in schools, retirement and nursing homes, or hospitals, and they are only cleared to go into these environments once they have been through manners and obedience training.

Animal assisted therapy (AAT), in which a specially trained animal is brought in as part of a team that might include registered nurses, nursing assistants, or occupational therapists, has also been shown to be beneficial to individuals with

dementia. Among other benefits, it can help improve short-term memory and communication skills.

Emotional support animals, on the other hand, need no specialized training. Dogs and cats are obvious choices, but people also find calming company in rabbits, birds, reptiles, llamas, and ponies. These animals are most helpful for people with a variety of anxiety disorders, but they can also be of comfort to people undergoing stressful events.

One friend who recently underwent a bone graft at her dentist's office was delighted to have the dentist's dog lie across her lap during the whole procedure.

Emotional support animals are protected under the Fair Housing Amendments Act, which upholds the right to have an emotional support animal without having to pay pet fees or deposits. In the past, all major airlines allowed emotional support animals to travel in the cabin of the airplane for free. Starting this year, many airlines have announced that service animals are restricted to dogs.

Lastly, there is an emerging field called veterinary social work, which trains social workers to work with pet owners who may need help or support coping with a pet's illness or death. Referrals typically come from vets themselves, who may not feel comfortable or have the time to offer extended support to pet owners.

Tom Favale, a social worker and veterinarian who practices at the University of Tennessee College of Veterinary Medicine in Knoxville, says

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their services can be a lifeline for pet owners who need the support of someone who understands the humananimal bond.

Annie Schoonover, whose beloved horse Justy, died in January, says the opportunity to work remotely with Favale was "a giant miracle, like a life raft thrown to me," she says, adding that she emerged from her grief "more human, more compassionate and more present."

Indeed, pets can distract us from our problems, help us feel more engaged, inspire us to move on from past struggles and even perform tasks that we might have lost the ability to perform ourselves.

In my life I have had the privilege of caring for 10 dogs, two cats and three horses, including my current two dogs, Jada and Zayde. My husband and I love to hike with them at a nearby nature preserve, which helps us bond with them, and ensures that we ourselves keep walking — and talking — every day.

Our beloved pets give us freedom, independence and love — and yes, are a lifeline to a better, safer, more joyful life.

Years ago, GAGC was notified by our dog source of a greyhound puppy that was very small, being bullied by her littermates, and would never race. She was offered to us for adoption. Longtime members *Debbie* and *Jami* said they would take the puppy and called her **Macy**. It wasn't until they got the puppy home that it was discovered she had extra feet on both of her back legs. The extra feet were eventually removed. Besides having the deformities on her

> legs, **Macy** had never gone through the race training that makes these dogs such terrific pets, so she had a strongwilled lack of discipline. As she

grew older, other anomalies and health challenges emerged, yet she thrived with her family. Debbie and Jami learned to make accommodations for Macy, who ended up living a remarkably long life. Ten years! She was an outspoken, stubborn, vocal alpha of the pack her whole life, despite being the smallest. She was remarkably smart, sweet and affectionate, but GAGC learned from this experience that greyhound puppies that miss out on racing school require a lot of special attention, discipline, training, and not all make good pets. Debbie and Jami were lucky with Macy, and she evolved into a much-loved member of the family who lived a good life that she may not have otherwise had. Her physical problems finally caught up with her and her family had to let her go in early July. We are glad we were able to take Macy, and that her family was able to give her such a great life.

# Central Parke Memory Care Center


From Brenda:


# Dog runs, fosters & adoptions

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
