## **Greyt Health & Safety**

# Is that houseplant safe for your pets?

ASPCA, Feb. 27, 2019

Did you know that houseplants, in addition to being aesthetically pleasing, can also provide health benefits for you and your pet? Houseplants have been noted to keep carbon dioxide levels down, remove certain pollutants, improve moisture levels and keep airborne dust down in homes. But unfortunately, some of those green-leafed beauties may be troublesome for our four-legged friends, and it's important to be mindful when

bringing something potentially toxic into your home.

The ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center (APCC) has put together a short list of common houseplants that could be problematic to your pets so that you can stay informed on how to keep your furry friends safe, happy and healthy.

#### MILDLY TOXIC PLANTS

## Fiddle leaf fig (Ficus lyrate) and spider plant (Chlorophytum comosum)

Both the fiddle leaf fig and spider plant are mildly toxic to dogs and cats. With small ingestions of the plant material, there is a risk for mild gastrointestinal irritation. The most common signs observed are vomiting and diarrhea. Sap from the fiddle leaf fig could also cause skin irritation.

Pothos or devil's ivy (Epipremnum aureum), dumbcane (Dieffenbachia spp.), peace lily (Spathiphyllum spp.), philodendron, calla lily (Zantedeschia aethiopica) and Chinese evergreen (Aglaonema)

These six plants contain insoluble calcium oxalates. The stem, leaf stalk and leaves contain tiny crystals that can result in irritation to the mouth and GI tract when chewed on or ingested. Symptoms typically include nausea, drooling, retching, vomiting and diarrhea. In rare cases irritation may become severe and result in swelling of the tongue and back of the throat, resulting in trouble breathing and trouble swallowing. Exposures to these plants are not considered to be life-threatening, but pets who show more severe gastrointestinal distress or have difficulty breathing may require veterinary intervention.

### Corn plant, dragon tree and ribbon

**MODERATELY TOXIC PLANTS** 

## plant (Dracaena spp)

Dracaena are categorized as moderately toxic plants. In dogs and cats, small exposures usually cause mild vomiting or diarrhea. However, larger exposures can lead to depression, weakness and lack of coordination. Cats may also develop large pupils, rapid breathing, an elevated heart rate, drooling and abdominal discomfort. If your pet ingests a large amount of these plants, it is best to contact your veterinarian or APCC.

### Jade plant (Crassula ovata) Most exposures to Jade plants in cats and dogs cause mild gastrointestinal irritation in the form of vomiting and diarrhea. In some pets, lethargy, ataxia, muscle trem-

ors and an elevated heart rate can occur. Although cats seem to be more sensitive to this plant than dogs, more severe symptoms are rare.

### **SEVERELY TOXIC PLANTS**

### Sago palm (Cycas revoluta)

Sago palms are one of the most dangerous ornamental plants to both cats and dogs. All parts of the plant are toxic. However, the seeds contain the highest concentration of toxins. The main concern with an exposure to this plant is liver failure. Vomiting is very common after exposures and can develop within minutes of ingestion. Other signs may include severe vomiting and diarrhea with blood, lethargy, anorexia and seizures. Liver failure can develop within three days. It is important to contact your veterinarian as soon as possible if your pet ingested part of this plant.

### **Easter lily (Lilium longiflorum)**

Easter lilies are highly toxic to cats. Very

small exposures to any part of the plant, including the pollen, can result in kidney injury and death. Without veterinary intervention, exposures can be life threatening. Kidney failure can develop within 48 to 72 hours. Vomiting is common after exposures and is typically seen within the first 24 hours. Further signs include depression, lethargy and anorexia. Cats are the only known species to develop kidney injury as a result of exposure. Dogs who ingest this plant may experience mild vomiting or diarrhea, but serious problems have not been seen.

If you believe you pet has ingested a potentially toxic plant and you are concerned, you should contact either your local veterinarian or APCC at (888) 426-4435. And if you have a plant in your home that's not on this list, you can also download the APCC mobile app for information on many other plants.

### Dangers lurking in every room of your home: An in-depth look

### **Attic**

While the attic is not necessarily a common place for our pets to go, it's a place that's often overlooked when it comes to pet dangers. Mothballs, rodenticides and insecticides may be used in attics to ward off pests, but can be problematic for your furry friends. Make sure your pet steers clear of the attic and doesn't follow you up.

### **Bathroom**

A surprising number of bathroom items could prove to be toxic or harmful to your pets. Many people store common household cleaners in their bathrooms, which could be extremely dangerous if ingested, inhaled or come into contact with your

pet's skin. Other dangers include soaps and oral hygiene products such as tooth-paste or mouthwash, which can contain the dangerous sugar substitute, xylitol. Items such as dental floss, cotton balls and other inedible products can also cause obstructions if consumed by your pets. You should always keep personal products and items in a medicine cabinet or up high enough so that your pet cannot reach them.

#### **Bedrooms**

Bedrooms are a great place to spend quality time snuggling with our best furfriends. While less problematic than other rooms in the house, medications are a big concern in this room. Due to either the low nature or easy accessibility of many tables or nightstands in bedrooms, these are not safe places to store medications. And if you have kids (the human kind), help them to remember to pick up bags in their rooms that may contain gum, food or candy that your pets can easily sniff out.



#### Kitchen

The kitchen is one of the main rooms in the house where pets get themselves into trouble. Like us, our furry friends associate the kitchen with pleasant scents and tastes, so they often are on the lookout for yummy things to eat. Besides food, medications, cleaning products and trash bins are other sources of danger in the kitchen. Keeping food in the fridge and cabinets and keeping lids on trash bins, putting medications out of reach and keeping your pets out of the room when using cleaning products can help keep them safe.

### **Living room**

While less tempting than the kitchen, dangers in the living room are a great example of the fact that something doesn't have to taste good for our pets ingest it. Batteries, plants and fragrance products are the primary dangers found in this room. If your furry friend thinks everything is a chew toy, make sure to watch out for these common dangers and keep them up and out of paws' reach.

### **Laundry room**

Laundry rooms are where our pets tend to exhibit their sillier sides. Knocking down detergent bottles or grabbing old dryer sheets and running away are two common scenarios seen. But it's not all fun and games: laundry detergent pods are a quick gulp away from some nasty vomiting and possible aspiration. Keeping laundry products in a cabinet and picking up any dropped dryer sheets or pods is always a good idea.

### Garage

Unfortunately garages can be a very dangerous room for our furry friends. Many people store a variety of chemi-

cals in their garage which can be serious concerns for pets. Common use of rodenticides in the garage poses an added danger. Make sure to keep your pet out of your garage while using any chemicals, and when done, securely close any chemicals and put them up and out of reach.


#### Yard

As warmer weather approaches, APCC sees an increase in calls about dangers in the yard. Keeping an eye out for dangerous plants and mushrooms is always advised. While it's nice to have company while working in the yard, be aware of what your pet is doing. They may be following you around, eating that fertilizer you are placing, or find that it's a good time to dig up an ants' nest. When using any chemicals on your yard, it's best to keep your four-legged friends away until it is dry or watered in. Also, remember if you do a lot of grilling, lighter fluid and charcoal briquettes are two common outdoor dangers.

If you believe your pet has ingested something potentially toxic, contact your local veterinarian or APCC at (888) 426-4435 immediately.

### **Pet Sitters**

Do you need a pet sitter for your greys while you're out of town? We keep a list of potential pet sitters but we are always looking for more willing folks, both for the Dayton and the Cincinnati areas. ### **Pet food recalls**

The FDA periodically updates their website with new pet food recalls. Don't take a chance with your pet's health. Please visit the <u>FDA website</u> to check the safety of your pet's food.

# Hill's Pet Nutrition voluntarily recalls select canned dog food for excessive vitamin D

Hill's Pet Nutrition is voluntarily recalling select canned dog food products due to potentially elevated levels of vitamin D. While vitamin D is an essential nutrient for dogs, ingestion of elevated levels can lead to potential health issues depending on the level of vitamin D and the length of exposure, and dogs may exhibit symptoms such as vomiting, loss of appetite, increased thirst, increased urination, excessive drooling, and weight loss. Vitamin D, when consumed at very high levels, can lead to serious health issues in dogs including renal dysfunction. Pet parents with dogs who have consumed any of the products listed and are exhibiting any of these signs should contact their veterinarian. In most cases, complete recovery is expected after discontinuation of feeding.

In the United States, the affected canned dog foods were distributed through retail pet stores and veterinary clinics nationwide. No dry foods, cat foods, or treats are affected.

### Items for sale



We really appreciate all of you who have returned your unwanted black combo leads and blue or red reflective tag collars to GAGC to reuse for future adoptions.
Recycling these collar sets helps GAGC save money. If you no longer need yours, please return it to *Brenda* or *Kathy*, or take it to any M&G and the rep will turn them in for reuse.

Did we loan you a belly band when you adopted your male greyhound? If you still have it, please wash it if needed and return it to *Brenda* or *Kathy*. We like to keep some available for future loans and our supply tends to run out quickly. Some of our books are still out on loan. Please return those as well so they will be available to new adopters. Do you still have a GAGC loaner crate? We need those back, usually in 30 days or less, to make them available for other new adopters. If you still have one, please contact *Brenda* or *Kathy* and make arrangements to return it. Thanks!

A little history of me and my hounds! Did you know that we have been owned by 10 greyhounds?! We have fostered many, many dogs waiting for their forever homes and the dogs pictured have helped numerous dogs adjust off the track. All of our dogs have been ambassadors for GAGC and our families. The pictured Pennix hounds starting at the top left are: Elroy, Tobee, Ellie Mae, Crissy, Betsy, Fave, Bernie, Mimi, Bella and **Hawkeye**, not in any adoption order. In 1998, Ron and I adopted Elroy from another group and fell in love with the breed. We wanted to help more dogs find forever homes that retired from their racing career, so several of us decided to start our own group. I was elected president when we started this organization in 2002. My dogs' adoption order



is: Elroy (big, alpha boy); then Ellie Mae (shy, timid girl); Mimi (blue, lots of personality); Fave (very timid, little girl who lived 16 years; she was elected Queen at Mountain Hounds in Gatlinburg); Bernie (perfect boy); **Tobee** (he was 8 when he was returned and we adopted him; always made me laugh); Crissy (Ron's dog; she loves her rubs and represents GAGC well); **Bella** (gorgeous, quiet girl, but she loved **Harley**, died way too young at only 5 years old); **Betsy** (littlest greyhound I've ever seen, very sweet; we adopted her at 1½); and latest Pennix family member, **Hawkeye** (3 years old, quiet and a real love bug). Submit your favorite candid shots of your greyhound family members no later than May 10. The pictures will be voted on at the annual GAGC picnic in May. After the votes have been tallied, the photos go to the printer and the calendars will be ready for pick up at the fall picnic. We usually start taking orders over the summer.

Again this year, we are taking submissions for the name of the calendar. Huggable Hounds, A Year of Greytness, and Greyt Expectations have been just a few. We will also vote on the name at the picnic. Please limit your calendar name submission to one suggestion per household.

We also have a Memory page for all of those greyt friends who have crossed over the Rainbow Bridge. If you have a grey you would like to include, please send me their name and memorial date (and a picture if you like, just follow the submission guidelines below). This year, we will take submissions for those who crossed starting in June 2018 through May 2019.

#### Need to know information:

- Picture size is important. We can do some size adjustment of pictures; however, if the picture is quite small or quite large, it may be difficult to get a good quality resolution. Please set your camera on the highest resolution possible when snapping shots of your greyhounds.
- 2. Pictures that are in landscape form (instead of portrait) are more likely to make the month photos (as opposed to the collages) in the calendar design. Don't worry portrait photos can be submitted.

- 3. Candid, everyday shots are preferred. We avoid professional pictures for two reasons —we don't want to get into any problems with copyright or artistic infringement, and we want an even playing field for the pooches. Here are some suggestions that have done well:
  - Holidays: Any holiday (Christmas, Hanukkah, Easter, Valentine's, Birthday, etc.)
  - Seasonal: If you have a great shot of the beach, the snow, autumn leaves, throw it in.
  - Quirky shots: Cockroaching, weird expressions, funny ears, etc.
  - Cuteness: Big eyes, cuddling, etc.
- 4. Picture formats: Electronic formats (.jpg or other similar format) are great and definitely preferred. However, we will gladly take print submissions:
  - if the quality of the photo is good (because we will have to scan in later), and
  - the print is a copy, not an original. (In the case of print submissions, we will endeavor to get them back to you.)
- 5. Based upon popular demand, we have upped the limit on the photo submissions. Please send up to five per household. If you have more and you want Angie to choose, just indicate it in your email.
- If you submitted pictures last year and one was selected for the calendar, please do not resubmit it. If you submitted pictures which did not make the calendar, you may resubmit those pictures for voting.

**Feb. 10**Early in the morning on Feb. 10, *Phil* 




