Greyt health & safety

Cats shed more than dogs. The Coronavirus, not fur.

A new experiment confirmed that cats can spread the virus to one another, and found dogs did not shed the virus. There's still no evidence that pets transmit it to humans. By James Gorman, New York Times, Sept. 29, 2020

A new scientific report confirms that cats and dogs can be infected by the novel coronavirus, and that neither animal is likely to get sick. Cats, however, do develop a strong, protective immune response, which may make them worth studying when it comes to human vaccines.

There is still no evidence to suggest that pets have passed the virus to humans, although cats do shed the virus and infect other cats.

Infected dogs in the new study didn't produce the virus in their upper respiratory tracts and didn't shed it at

> results. Neither the cats nor the dogs in the study showed any


not a significant concern for human infection. Angela M. Bosco-Lauth, Airn E. Hartwig, Stephanie M. Porter and other researchers at Colorado State University's College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences note that while millions of humans have been infected with the virus worldwide and 1 million have died, there are only a handful of reports of pets that have become infected naturally.

If cats can shed the virus, why aren't they infecting people, which is a theoretical possibility? One reason is that the number of humans who have contracted the virus is so large, and they are the ones giving it to cats. Another possible reason is that infection in everyday life is very different from infection in the lab.

In the new experimental work, scientists inserted pipettes in the nasal cavities of cats and dogs to give them the virus. The animals received anesthesia before the procedure, but the point is that this doesn't happen in most homes. Later, other cats were put into close contact with the infected cats, who were shedding virus.

Does this happen in the real world? There is some evidence of street cats in Wuhan, China, having been exposed to the virus. But it may be that in the United States, because many cats are kept indoors, transmission is minimal.

Or, Dr. Bosco-Lauth said, cat infection with the virus could be relatively common without humans noticing, because of a lack of symptoms.



October 2020 3 "Those cats that were infected in the experiment?" she said. "You would never have known."

Cats might also pass the virus on to wildlife. Dr. Bosco-Lauth said that an as yet unpublished work shows that deer mice may become infected with the novel coronavirus.

Also, outside a lab, infection depends mainly on breathing in viral particles from an infected person and normal contact doesn't necessarily translate into infection for animals. Ferrets have been shown in the laboratory to be susceptible to infection with the virus, and to spread it to other ferrets.

But scientists at Tufts reported, in a paper that has yet to be peer-reviewed, that in one house with 29 pet ferrets and

two humans with Covid not one ferret became infected with the virus.

The 29 ferrets roamed freely in the house, and both human adults were ill enough with Covid to show symptoms, so there was ample opportunity for infection. Kaitlin Sawatzki, a virologist at Tufts University and one of the authors of the ferret paper, said, "Isn't that incredible? It was a beautiful natural experiment."

The researchers concluded that there could be genetic barriers to infection that are overcome in a lab with concentrated doses of virus. Minks, which are in the same family as ferrets, appear to be very easily infected, and to get sick from the disease. Researchers have also reported transmission from animals to humans at mink farms in the Netherlands in a paper not yet peer-reviewed. Dr. Sawatzki said the paper showed "very strong evidence of multiple, independent mink-to-human transmission events."

The Colorado State researchers advise keeping cats indoors, particularly if a human in a household has become infected, because they could spread it to other cats. Also, if a person with Covid needs to be admitted to a hospital and has pet cats, Dr. Porter suggested, the cat's caretakers should know to observe social distancing as they would with a person.

The infected cats that showed immunity, Dr. Bosco-Lauth said, were animals that were infected by contact with other cats, not by pipette. And, she said, the immune response was stronger than in

some other laboratory animals, although how long that protection might last is completely unknown.

Pet food recalls

Sunshine Mills, Inc. expands previously announced voluntary recall of certain pet food products due to potentially elevated levels of Aflatoxin

Sunshine Mills, Inc. is expanding its voluntary recall of certain pet food products that were made with corn that contained Aflatoxin at levels above FDA's action levels. This is an expansion of the recall initiated Sept. 2, 2020, after an investigation conducted along with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration determined that additional corn-based pet food products produced between April 3, 2020, and April 5, 2020 may contain corn from a single load of corn with elevated levels of aflatoxin. Aflatoxin is a naturally occurring mold by-product from the growth of Aspergillus flavus and can be harmful to pets if consumed in significant quantities. No illnesses have been reported in association with these products to date, and no other Sunshine Mills, Inc. pet food products are affected by this announcement.

Sunshine Mills, Inc. has chosen to expand its voluntary recall to include these additional products as a precautionary measure in furtherance of its commitment to the safety and quality of its products. Pets with aflatoxin toxicity (aflatoxicosis) may show symptoms of illness including sluggishness or lethargy combined with a reluctance to eat, vomiting, yellowish tint to the eyes or gums, diarrhea, and in some cases, death. Pets experiencing any of these symptoms after consuming the recalled products should be seen by a veterinarian.

All were very young, **Jamie** only 1.5 years old and the rest 2-year-olds. Here's a report from *Irene*: Tuesday, Sept. 8 was a beautiful day for driving through the country. The added treat was meeting four newbies ready for forever homes. Two sweet, lovely red girls, Jamie and **Rori** were ready to ride with me to their next stop on their new journey. Rori was very curious and loved seeing where we were. **Jamie** took her beauty sleep until we got to the side roads on our way to Brenda's. At that point, all the

windows were occupied by busy faces wondering where we were going. Happy new forever homes kids; enjoy your new lives. We had one-day notice that on Sept. 12, Pat C Richard S and Pat C Rain S, two Florida males, were heading to Ohio. Marianne headed to Lore to collect the boys and reported the following: Brenda was hoping to receive two dogs from Florida sometime after Sept. 14, so imagine her surprise and need to scramble when on Friday the 11th she was told the dogs were coming the next day. She called to see if I could still do the run, and "thanks" to COVID-19, the calendar was empty and I could. The hauler arrived at 4:15 a.m., having left Florida around 8:30 the night before. Then, just as suddenly, all was quiet again. Brenda, Kathy, and two fostering folks were waiting for our arrival. They watered and fed them, and took the photos for the website. All three are lovely brindles and are going to look great on sofas!

Brenda and Irene each drove to West Virginia on Oct. 14 to pick up a boy— AMF Living Large (Dillon)—and two girls—AMF Remade (Debbie) and PJK Leslie—arriving from Florida.
